Can we still probably get Crescent City?

If the referendum with Unit 9 is voted down, Crescent City can approach Iroquois West 10. However, if IW passes a bond before the consolidation with any district, that district would not assume the long-term debt of IW. Consolidation would need to occur first in order for the debt to be shared between the two consolidating districts.

Can we still get the football fields added to the plan?

The board will consider that option. However, including all athletic facilities will add an additional 30 cents to the tax rate. The athletic facilities can always be added at a later date when they can be afforded. Iroquois West will continue to use the existing athletic fields.

Can the school be in town rather than in the country?

The board will consider land acquisition that has proper infrastructure and is fair to the economic interest of both economic centers of the district.

I strongly recommend listing all of the code violations that need to be addressed in the buildings.

There are no current code violations. However, buildings built in the 1920s have different code requirements than modern facilities.

Why has everything been allowed to fall in such disrepair?

In the last seven years, \$1,160,000 have been put into maintenance and day-to-day repair costs at the high school alone. The district also has four other buildings to maintain the physical plant.

Do we have escape plans if anything were to happen to the school?

Yes, the school district has emergency and evacuation plans at all five buildings and meets annually with local emergency personnel and crisis management teams to update and review these plans.

Could this be done with a sales tax increase rather than a property tax increase?

The Districts in Iroquois County have tried twice to pass a 1% sales tax, which was defeated both times. The district has inquired into the possibility of adding a .01 gas sales tax through home rule.

If our enrollment dropped, would we be able to put the Middle School and High School in the same building?

No, enrollment would have to drop drastically and our enrollment has remained consistent for many years. However, the building being considered would not house more than 350 combined students.

What do other schools in the area look like compared to IW?

The district will not comment for the boards of education in other districts.

Have you given consideration to consolidation of the county or partial possible county?

This option was considered approximately 15 years ago with a High School near Woodland. However, with Iroquois County being the third largest county in the state there would be transportation issues.

Can you guarantee that building costs will not go up like they did at KCC and Milford? The IW board of Education will not speak for another district's issues. However, the KCC project was started 8 years ago, but had to be put on hold due to loss of funding from the state. Over 8 years, with construction costs increasing on average 3% yearly, there was considerable increase. IW is working very closely with their architect and is being methodological in its planning process and not rushing, ensuring that costs are accurate and mistakes do not occur.
